From the desks of the Antiracist Teachers Network:

Welcome back to another school year with the Anti-Racist Teachers Network right by your side (digitally or physically)!

As we enter a new school year and review all of our start-up materials (be sure to refer back to <u>Issue 14</u> of our newsletter) one thing we have been watching is the increase in censorship of diverse voices through the process of book banning. Book Banning is defined by **the <u>Free Speech Center</u>** as:

"...When private individuals, government officials or organizations remove books from libraries, school reading lists or bookstore shelves because they object to their content, ideas or themes. Those advocating a ban complain typically that the book in question contains graphic violence, expresses disrespect for parents and family, is sexually explicit, exalts evil, lacks literary merit, is unsuitable for a particular age group, or includes offensive language. Other complaints have been that the book is written by or deals with sexual orientation or gay issues or brings up topics like slavery that might make individuals uncomfortable."

Now, we know what you're thinking, I've heard that this is only happening in the United States. There is no way this is happening in my area! Unfortunately, dear readers, it is. So this month's ATN issue is not only coming in with our usual recommendations but ways to ensure diverse voices continue to live and thrive in your classrooms. We hope this helps provide another way to frame your anti-racist school year and allow your students to bring their whole self into your space.




