## From the desk of the ATN's guest writer: Kaylah - Grade 6 student

Welcome to the fourth issue of the Antiracist Teacher Network Newsletter. This month, we're sharing a student reflection following a visit to Blackfoot Crossing, written by Kaylah, a grade 6 student in Calgary:

Located on one of the many bends of the Bow River, Blackfoot Crossing is recognized as a National Historic Site. The variety of natural and archaeological resources and its sacred place in Siksika traditions have made it important over many generations. The lands along the Bow River were recognized and respected for its landscape features and natural resources.

At Blackfoot Crossing on September 22 1877, representatives of the Siksika, Piikani, Kainai, Nakoda and Tsuu T'ina peoples met with representatives of the Crown to sign Treaty No. 7. The Blackfoot Crossing site, which is part of the Siksika Indian Reserve No. 146, includes landscape features and archaeological remains that were important during the signing of the treaty.

Blackfoot Crossing is an important traditional meeting place in Blackfoot territory. This crossing of the Bow River was historically a bison-hunting and gathering place for the Siksika people and their allies in the Blackfoot Confederacy. The Crossing was used for centuries by the Blackfoot Confederacy as a natural fording place and encampment site, as they followed migrating bison herds. It was also here that Crowfoot, chief of the Siksika, is believed to have died and been buried.
