WELCOME TO THE "CHRISTMIFICATION" OF WINTER

From the desks of the Antiracist Teachers Network:

We know what some of our dedicated readers are thinking right now ... No, we are not the Grinches in your school trying to steal Christmas by knocking over trees and taking tinsel off doors. The ATN is not against the spirit of Christmas or becoming the Scourges that need some festive seasonal cheer (we appreciate the kindness that emerges at this time of year).

ATN members discussed during our last collaborative meeting how "Winter Time" quickly becomes "Christmas Time" in many schools when the first snow falls. This had us thinking - How could we holistically recognize the various holidays of different cultures throughout the year, and what challenges come with this? The ATN's discussion led to many strong ideas and information to help schools move towards a more balanced representation of different holiday recognitions.

Here are our five key ideas:

- Bring it back to your students to suggest celebrations without making them the monolith for learning, centre them in the conversation.
- Diversify your parent council to help with sharing information about certain cultural celebrations as parents are one of the most important pieces of a student's educational experiences
- Set up a culture days calendar with families, students and staff that is accessible and visible to all in your school and online
- Recognizing that your concerts and celebrations around this time of the year can include information about other cultural celebrations with care
- · Last but not least, don't force it--As some ATN members pointed out the intent does not remove the impact of certain actions. Don't force holiday celebrations on your students that don't observe them and don't expect students to educate you or have strong ties to certain culture celebrations. Everyones identities are different and intersect in ways that make them unique individuals.

With winter comes longer commute times due to snowfall and weather fluctuations. Here are Five Powerful Podcasts you can check out to keep you company during those long commutes home!




Leading Equity Podcast
